 2 (9.45 am)
 3 (In the absence of the jury)
 4 JUDGE LUCRAFT: Mr Hough, I'm pleased to say that --
 5 (Recording in progress announcement)
 6 That's also very good to know. That wasn't me.
 7 I'm pleased to report that, as they've shown
 8 throughout, the jury were not only here for 9.45, but
 9 here early so we'll have them into court.
 10 MR HOUGH: Very good.
 11 (In the presence of the jury)
 12 JUDGE LUCRAFT: Good morning, everyone. Very nice to see
 13 you all. Can I again compliment you on your
 14 timekeeping. It is simply extraordinary, in my
 15 experience, to have people who are here always on time.
 16 Thank you very much indeed, it is greatly appreciated.
 17 I will ask then for the jury bailiffs to retake their
 18 oath or affirmation.
 19 (The jury bailiffs were sworn)
 20 JUDGE LUCRAFT: Thank you very much. So I'll ask you then,
 21 please, to retire and continue with your deliberations,
 22 thank you very much.
 23 (9.49 am)
 24 (The jury retired to continue their deliberations)
 25 (12.03 pm)

1 JUDGE LUCRAFT: Mr Hough, I have had a question from the
 2 jury which relates to one of the questions in the
 3 questionnaire that they are dealing with, question 4,
 4 and the question I will read so that everyone can hear
 5 it is as follows:
 6 "In terms of the wording 'guidance', is an omission
 7 or failure of sharing guidance a thought process that
 8 took place within a body and was then not shared, or
 9 a thought process that should have taken place and
 10 didn't, and therefore was not shared?"
 11 It's a very good question, I think, to have been
 12 asked, and shows that obviously they're following the
 13 points very closely in the document they've been
 14 provided with.
 15 What I intend to say by way of answer is as follows:
 16 "An omission or failure to share guidance is
 17 an organisation or person not sharing with another
 18 organisation or person some guidance which you consider
 19 they ought to have shared. In answer to your question,
 20 the omission or failure could be not sharing a thought
 21 process which did take place, or a thought process which
 22 you consider should have taken place and should have
 23 been shared."
 24 MR HOUGH: Sir, I'll repeat that so that everyone can hear
 25 it. The answer is:

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1 "An omission or failure to share guidance is
 2 an organisation or person not sharing with another
 3 organisation or person some guidance which you consider
 4 they ought to have shared. In answer to your question,
 5 the omission or failure could be not sharing a thought
 6 process which did take place, or a thought process which
 7 you consider should have taken place and should have
 8 been shared."
 9 JUDGE LUCRAFT: Just so that everyone understands the
 10 process, what I'm going to do is to have the jury in.
 11 I will read the question and because it's rather easier,
 12 I think, for the jury to have it in black and white,
 13 they'll actually have a copy of the document I've just
 14 read in front of them when they are brought in.
 15 MR HOUGH: Yes, sir. I can see no objection.
 16 (In the presence of the jury)
 17 JUDGE LUCRAFT: Welcome back, ladies and gentlemen. What
 18 I'm going to do is I'm going to read your question, then
 19 I'm going to read you my answer. I'm also going to
 20 provide you with a copy of the answer which I hope will
 21 help you to follow what it is I'm going to say. It may
 22 be that the copies aren't ready at the moment, in which
 23 case I will read it and then we will have the copies
 24 brought through to your retiring room.
 25 So your question was this, and it relates to

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1 question 4:
 2 "In terms of the wording 'guidance', is an omission
 3 or failure of sharing guidance a thought process that
 4 took place within a body and was not shared, or
 5 a thought process that should have taken place and
 6 didn't, and therefore was not shared."
 7 And the answer is as follows:
 8 "An omission or failure to share guidance is
 9 an organisation or person not sharing with another
 10 organisation or person some guidance which you consider
 11 they ought to have shared. In answer to your question,
 12 the omission or failure could be not sharing a thought
 13 process which did take place, or a thought process which
 14 you consider should have taken place and should have
 15 been shared."
 16 Shall I read that again, just whilst we're all here?
 17 "In answer to your question, the omission or failure
 18 could be not sharing a thought process which did take
 19 place, or a thought process which you consider should
 20 have taken place and should have been shared."
 21 As I say, there will be some questions of that to
 22 come through to your room which I hope will assist, and
 23 I will ask you, please, to retire and to continue with
 24 your deliberations. Thank you.
 25 (12.08 pm)

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1 (The jury retired to continue their deliberations)
 2 I'll rise.
 3 (12.09 pm)
 4 (A short break)
 5 (1.14 pm)
 6 JUDGE LUCRAFT: Mr Hough, I can report that the jury have
 7 followed their instruction, they have sent through their
 8 master copy of the questionnaire and they have answered
 9 the questions that they have been asked to answer.
 10 What I am going to do is to have the jury in and
 11 I will take them through the questions in turn and ask
 12 the foreman or forelady to confirm that those are their
 13 determinations. For the purposes of doing it, in due
 14 course two separate documents will be used, which is one
 15 for Jack and one for Saskia which seems to us to make
 16 the most sense, although the jury have answered the
 17 questions 1 and 2 together, I will simply make clear to
 18 them in due course there will be two documents provided.
 19 MR HOUGH: Yes, there will be one questionnaire which
 20 contains the question 2 relating to Saskia and in
 21 question 1, a reference to Saskia being unlawfully
 22 killed, and the same for Jack, so each will have their
 23 own specific questionnaire.
 24 JUDGE LUCRAFT: Thank you.
 25 (In the presence of the jury)

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1 Ladies and gentlemen, thank you very much indeed for
 2 sending through to me your master completed
 3 questionnaire. What I'm going to do is I'm going to ask
 4 your foreman or forelady just to stand, and what
 5 I'm going to do is just to go through the questionnaire
 6 as you have completed it, and just simply ask her to
 7 confirm on behalf of all of you that that is correct.
 8 We'll take it each question in turn. If you would
 9 prefer to sit at any stage, please do, that's fine.
 10 So taking question 1, and the question was:
 11 "Are you satisfied on the balance of probabilities
 12 Saskia Jones was unlawfully killed?"
 13 Your answer is yes; is that correct?
 14 THE FOREMAN OF THE JURY: Yes.
 15 JUDGE LUCRAFT: In respect of the same question in respect
 16 of Jack Merritt, are you satisfied that on the balance
 17 of probabilities, Jack Merritt was unlawfully killed;
 18 again you have answered yes?
 19 THE FOREMAN OF THE JURY: Yes.
 20 JUDGE LUCRAFT: Thank you.
 21 Turning then to question 2, and again, dealing with
 22 Saskia first of all, and you were asked whether you
 23 agreed with the following statement, I'll read the
 24 statement:
 25 "On 29 November 2019, Saskia Jones was at an event

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1 at Fishmongers' Hall in London. The event was held for
 2 the five-year anniversary of Learning Together. Saskia
 3 had been invited to attend, having previously
 4 volunteered for Learning Together while she was studying
 5 at Cambridge University. An attendee at the event who
 6 was on licence having been convicted of an offence under
 7 the Terrorism Act 2000, armed with two knives, attacked
 8 Saskia near to the cloakroom at Fishmongers' Hall.
 9 Saskia suffered a single stab wound to her neck and she
 10 collapsed near to the place where she was attacked.
 11 This was part of a terrorist attack. The attacker moved
 12 from that area and began attacking further attendees of
 13 the event and a member of staff at Fishmongers' Hall
 14 when that member of staff tried to intervene. Saskia's
 15 injury was not survivable. Saskia was treated by
 16 attendees of the event, police officers and ambulance
 17 staff. She was assessed at dead at the scene by
 18 a paramedic and a doctor."
 19 And again, you have marked beneath that that you
 20 agree with that; is that correct?
 21 THE FOREMAN OF THE JURY: Yes.
 22 JUDGE LUCRAFT: Thank you. Again, taking the same question
 23 in respect of Jack Merritt, and again, I'll read the
 24 statement:
 25 "On 29 November 2019, Jack Merritt was at an event

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1 at Fishmongers' Hall in London. The event was held for
 2 the five-year anniversary of Learning Together. Jack
 3 was at the event as an employee of Cambridge University
 4 and worked for Learning Together. An attendee of the
 5 event who was on licence having been convicted of an
 6 offence under the Terrorism Act 2000, armed with two
 7 knives, attacked Jack in the gentlemen's toilets at
 8 Fishmongers' Hall. Jack suffered a number of injuries
 9 when stabbed. This was part of a terrorist attack. The
 10 attacker moved from the toilets and began attacking
 11 further attendees of the event and a member of staff at
 12 Fishmongers' Hall. Jack moved to a different room at
 13 Fishmongers' Hall and was later removed from the
 14 building. His injuries were not survivable. Jack was
 15 treated by members of the public, police officers,
 16 ambulance staff and HEMS doctors. He was assessed as
 17 dead at the scene by a doctor."
 18 Again, you've marked on the form you agree with that
 19 statement?
 20 THE FOREMAN OF THE JURY: Yes.
 21 JUDGE LUCRAFT: Thank you. Then taking question 3, which
 22 deals with the management of Khan in the community, is
 23 it correct that by the question:
 24 "Was there any omission or failure in the management
 25 of Usman Khan as an offender in the community

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1 by agencies of the State which contributed to the deaths
 2 of Jack Merritt and Saskia Jones?"
 3 You have marked "Yes" by that box?
 4 THE FOREMAN OF THE JURY: Yes.
 5 JUDGE LUCRAFT: And by way of explanation, you have set out
 6 the following:
 7 "Unacceptable management and lack of accountability.
 8 Serious deficiencies in the management of Khan by MAPPA.
 9 Insufficient experience and training. Blind spot to
 10 Khan's unique risks due to poster boy image and lack of
 11 psychological assessment post-release from prison."
 12 THE FOREMAN OF THE JURY: Yes.
 13 JUDGE LUCRAFT: Thank you. Moving to question 4, which
 14 relates to the sharing of information and guidance
 15 regarding Usman Khan, by the question:
 16 "Was there any omission or failure in the sharing of
 17 information and guidance by agencies responsible for
 18 monitoring or investigation of Usman Khan which
 19 contributed to the deaths of Jack Merritt and
 20 Saskia Jones?"
 21 You have answered "Yes" by that box.
 22 THE FOREMAN OF THE JURY: Yes.
 23 JUDGE LUCRAFT: And by way of explanation you have added
 24 this:
 25 "Missed opportunities for those with expertise and

1 experience to give guidance."
 2 THE FOREMAN OF THE JURY: Yes.
 3 JUDGE LUCRAFT: Thank you. And then moving to question 5,
 4 which deals with the organisation of and security
 5 measures for the event at Fishmongers' Hall. By the
 6 question:
 7 "Was there any omission or any deficiency in the
 8 organisation of and security measures for the event at
 9 Fishmongers' Hall which contributed to the deaths of
 10 Jack Merritt and Saskia Jones?"
 11 You have answered "Yes"?
 12 A. Yes.
 13 JUDGE LUCRAFT: And by way of explanation you have added the
 14 following:
 15 "Lack of communication and accountability,
 16 inadequate consideration of key guidance between
 17 parties, serious deficiencies in the management of Khan
 18 by MAPPA, and a failure to complete event-specific risk
 19 assessment by any party."
 20 THE FOREMAN OF THE JURY: Yes.
 21 JUDGE LUCRAFT: Thank you very much indeed, Madam Foreman,
 22 for confirming that.
 23 Mr Hough, I can also say that the jury have signed
 24 the Record of Inquest in respect of -- separate
 25 documents in respect of each of Jack Merritt and

1 Saskia Jones, and again, the medical cause of death,
 2 which was put on the document, was 1(a) shock and
 3 haemorrhage, 1(b) stab wound to the chest, and there is
 4 then reference to the attached questionnaire for the
 5 following questions which the jury were asked to deal
 6 with, and they have each, 11 of them, signed that
 7 document. I will sign and date it too, and in respect
 8 of Saskia Jones, again, the medical cause of death, 1(a)
 9 shock and haemorrhage, 1(b) stab wound to the chest, and
 10 again, a reference to the attached jury questionnaire
 11 signed by all 11 jurors which, again, I will sign and
 12 date.
 13 MR HOUGH: Yes, sir. The questionnaire for each of those
 14 who died will be published on the Inquest website and
 15 will be made available to the press with the answers to
 16 each typed to replace the jury's handwritten versions.
 17 The Records of Inquest, which obviously bear signatures,
 18 will not be put onto the Inquest website.
 19 JUDGE LUCRAFT: Thank you very much indeed.
 20 Ladies and gentlemen, that brings to a formal end
 21 your time as jurors on this Inquest. I know that you
 22 would like to say something, and I think one of your
 23 number is going to come forward just to say a few words.
 24 Thank you.
 25 A MEMBER OF THE JURY: Thank you. The jury would like to

1 send their heartfelt condolences to the families of
 2 Saskia and Jack, and to all who love and miss these two
 3 wonderful young people. They clearly touched the lives
 4 of so many, ours included. We want to convey to the
 5 families how seriously we have taken our collective
 6 responsibility, how important this is to us, how much
 7 your children matter.
 8 We also wanted to take this opportunity to thank the
 9 astonishing individuals who put themselves in real
 10 danger to help, and our incredible emergency services
 11 for their response both that day and every day. Once
 12 again to the families, we are so incredibly sorry. The
 13 world lost two bright stars that dreadful day.
 14 JUDGE LUCRAFT: Ladies and gentlemen, can I thank you very
 15 much indeed for those sentiments which I know are
 16 sentiments that we all share. It is very good of you to
 17 have put it in the way that you did, I don't think one
 18 could ever fault those words: they are really quite
 19 marvellous, thank you.
 20 You have been part of history, I'm pleased to tell
 21 you. It's the first time there's been an inquest
 22 conducted in this hall. You have been absolutely
 23 fantastic, if I might say so, not just in terms of your
 24 timekeeping, but your attention to the detail of this
 25 case.

1 I know when a summons arrives for jury service you
2 think: gosh, what am I going to be doing, and you may
3 have thought that when you turned up at the Guildhall in
4 the City of London, it might be something rather
5 special. Well, it has been, it's been absolutely unique
6 and I know that you go with our sincere thanks, all of
7 us who have been involved in this process.

8 If I could bottle you up and make every jury turn up
9 and pay the attention that you did, well, my life would
10 be so much easier. It's been seven weeks of your time,
11 I suspect it will live with you in your memories for
12 a very long time indeed, and quite right that it should
13 do, but you leave this court with my sincere gratitude
14 and heartfelt thanks for your diligent service to this
15 country. Thank you very much indeed.

16 (In the absence of the jury)

17 JUDGE LUCRAFT: Mr Hough, may I simply say to the families
18 myself, inquests are never things that one wants to have
19 to go through. I know that they are not easy things for
20 people to go through, but I sincerely hope that we have
21 made this not as painful as it might have been, we've
22 made it easier in the way that we can to help you, and
23 that many of the questions that you have had throughout
24 have been put by those who represent you and that the
25 answers have been some help in what is going forward.

1 I know that you have been able to follow, either in
2 person or online. The pandemic will live with us for
3 a long time. It's shown us ways in which we can do
4 things rather differently, but I hope whether you have
5 been physically here in the court or at home or
6 somewhere else that you have felt very much part of this
7 process.

8 I repeat what I said at the beginning of my
9 summing-up to the jury yesterday: I've certainly
10 regarded your two young children very much at the heart
11 of this process, and I certainly underline everything
12 the jury put in their rather touching note at the end of
13 this process. Thank you very much indeed.
